## MORE INFORMATION/SUGGESTIONS

This is a joyous song about the Bible that was given to us so we could know the Truth! The Bible is the truth that God showed and revealed to those who wrote it down for us.

These arrangements: hands alone, hands in parallel, and contrary motion without the B flat can be learned in the same fashion as the songs on the Anybody Can Play PIANO app. The notes can be color coded to match the fingers. Both hands stay within a 5 finger note pattern.

There can be rhythm games with this song since it has different types of notes. Sing the song so the students know the words and can sing and clap (every 2 beats). After learning the song, have students play and sing!

The contrary motion arrangements with the B flats should be taught to students who are reading music relatively well. If they have learned by the NOTES part of the ACPPIANO app, discuss how to figure out additional notes when you already know some of them. Before doing these arrangements, activities with the grand staff should be done so students understand why the treble clef is also called the G clef and the bass clef is also called F clef.
